This moth was formerly widely recorded in southern and eastern England. Its ecology is still poorly-understood, but it is associated with scrub and woodland in chalky districts and was regularly recorded in Croydon and Bromley during the 1950s. The last record in Greater London was from the Selsdon area, in 1981, where it may just remain as a resident species.
